# From the Principal's Desk



Greetings from Gurrie Middle School. It is my pleasure to welcome you all to the 2018-2019 school year.



(Our first team building activity results in a great picture!!)

We've had a very strong start to the school year. Students' have quickly adapted to new routines and expectations.

As we have done on the first day of school for the past eleven years, we were excited to orient our students to the overall expectations of Be Ready, Be Respectful, and Be Safe. Our school expectations are founded on the work we have done with PBIS (Positive Behavioral Strategies). PBIS is a school-wide strategy for helping all students achieve important social and learning goals. On the first full day of school, myself and the staff welcomed students and discussed the expectations that we have for each member of the Gurrie community. Students rotated through a series of stations where specific expectations were defined and taught. This approach allowed small groups of students to discuss and understand our three overarching expectations of being *Respectful*, *Ready*, and *Safe*. These expectations were then applied to areas such as riding the bus, classrooms, hallways, the cafeteria, and all other areas of the school building/community. Students discussed and talked about what it looks like to *Be Respectful* in areas such as the hallway, to *Be Ready* in the classroom, or to *Be Safe* on the bus. At the end of the morning, students were able to state what the expectations were at Gurrie and describe examples of what these expectations looked like throughout the building and school day. Over the past eleven plus years we have been tracking our behavior referral data and have noted significant reductions in the number of referrals being written. Through the tracking of this data, we have been able to address areas of concern over the years and create specific interventions to help support a more positive, supportive, and caring culture at Gurrie.

Our school expectations help provide for a safer school environment and give more time for instruction. We will apply consistent consequences and positive reinforcement for all students. By detailing every expected behavior and teaching students in a positive way, we provide a common language for everyone in our building - students, teachers, and staff. We acknowledge and reward students frequently with positive notes and other recognitions for their positive choices. We believe that by helping students practice good behavior, we will build a school community where all students have an environment where they can succeed and grow. Our PBIS behavior expectation matrix can be found on our Gurrie website and in your child's assignment notebook.

I am excited to welcome several new staff members to Gurrie. Mrs. Katherine Picht will be teaching our Culinary Arts classes. She brings passion and experience to this position and has had experience teaching Family and Consumer Science / Culinary Arts at the high school level. Sylwia Zalewska is our new math teacher at eighth grade. Ms. Zalewska came to us from York High School where she had great success teaching and supporting students and families. We are fortunate to welcome Mr. Fernando Gonzalez as our new Chief Custodian. Mr. Gonzalez has been the chief custodian at Ideal school for the past several years. Jayna Zant has joined our social work support team for the year while Mrs. Beutjer is on leave. Mrs. Zant is a supportive advocate for students and brings experience at both school and community positions in DuPage county. Maria Valadez has joined our kitchen staff. She comes to us from Ideal school and brings solid experiences to our great kitchen staff. I am confident that all of our new staff members, in collaboration with our veteran staff, will work together to provide exciting, challenging, and rewarding experiences for our students.

In this edition of Tiger Tracks there is a letter explaining our Homework Lab. Homework Lab is an intervention designed to provide students who may need additional assistance with their homework to complete it in a supportive and timely manner. We always call a parent and notify them if their student will be staying in Homework Lab that evening. Homework Lab runs from 3:15-4:00. A late bus is available for bus riders at 4:00. In an attempt to make calling and notifying parents more efficient and practical we use an automated phone call for Homework Lab. Student families will be notified via phone that their child needs to stay for Homework Lab that afternoon. If a parent has additional questions after receiving the call, they can call the school office for clarification at 708-482-2720. Please note that with the Wednesday early dismissal schedule, there will not be homework lab on Wednesdays.

We continue to provide another after school space for students to get academic support and complete homework. Our library is open each day after school and has student tutor volunteers from LT and one of our teachers available each afternoon. Students can come and complete homework, get support with a question, or work on a project with their classmates. This is also open from 3:15-4:00.

Each year students receive assignment notebooks. This is a great tool to assist with student organization and follow through. It is a great tool for parents as well, as it provides a common instrument for discussion regarding what students are studying, their assignments and projects, and their level of progress in that class. The student / parent handbook is found in the front of the planner. Please take time to review this with your student.

Our website is the most comprehensive source of building and activity information. We hope you will be a regular visitor. A link to your child's grades is included on this site. That link will take you to our student data base system, PowerSchool, where grades, assignments and test information are available. On PowerSchool grades are *live*. This means that the grades when entered are there for you to see immediately. Information on how to access PowerSchool and your child's grades was provided to you at Curriculum night and also in your registration packets. If you still have not received this information, please call the office and they can assist you.

All our weekly envelope materials will be sent home via email. Weekly envelope materials will also be placed on our website each week. You can request a hard copy of weekly materials by calling the office and having them sent home with your child. If you have not been receiving a weekly email from Gurrie please call the office to make sure we have a working email for you.

If you are an eighth grade parent, below are some very important dates to get into your calendar related to Lyons Township High School. More information will be coming home as we progress throughout the year regarding the transition. LT will be reviewing MAP assessments and other historical assessment data to place students for freshman year. 8<sup>th</sup> grade students will take their MAP assessments in December and that will be their most up to date data for the placement process.

### Vision and Hearing Screening

The district nurses will be performing vision and hearing screenings during the months of September through November.

The district's vision screenings are intended to help identify children with eye or vision problems that threaten sight or impair their ability to develop and learn normally. However, vision screenings are a limited process and cannot be used to diagnose an eye or vision problem, but rather to indicate a potential need for further evaluation.

Comprehensive vision examinations can only be conducted by an eye care professional with the specialized training needed to make a definitive diagnosis and prescribe treatment. Often, specialized equipment and procedures, which are not available as a part of a visual screening program, are needed to adequately evaluate a child's eye and vision status.

If you receive a referral from the district health office, please contact your eye doctor to get a full vision evaluation.

### Gurrie Middle School Dress Code



This is just a reminder that Gurrie Middle School does

have a dress code. It is expected that students will be dressed in an appropriate manner while at school or attending a school or PTO activity. Appropriate school dress includes clothing, accessories, or hair styles which are not disruptive to the students and therefore will not interfere with the educational program. Personal attire must be clean and safe so as not to be a hazard to the health and welfare of the student and other students in the school. Gurrie hopes that parents will take an active part in assisting their children in making intelligent decisions about their appearance in school.

Important items to consider when purchasing school clothing are:

- A. Clothing that is considered too revealing or suggestive in any way is prohibited.
- B. All clothing must cover from shoulder to mid thigh. (No bare midriff allowed.)
- C. Transparent items, spaghetti strapped tops, strapped shirts, strapless tops, single strapped tops, nightwear, or items normally worn as undergarments, but displayed as outerwear, are prohibited.
- D. Wearing of jewelry or clothing which displays obscene, profane, or vulgar language or pictures, tobacco, alcohol, firearms, illegal drugs, gang signs, colors or symbols is strictly prohibited.

Students who come to school in clothing which is not considered appropriate will be required to change. If necessary, parents may be called to bring appropriate attire to school for their student.

### **Early Act Club News**



The Early Act Club at Gurrie Middle School is a service organization sponsored by the Rotary Club of LaGrange. It is an international organization that helps people both within our community and throughout the world. The Club met on Tuesday, August 28h to plan our projects for the school year.

Our first project this year was a canned food drive to help the food pantry at St. Cletus. This provides assistance to people in need within our community. We collected non-perishable items in advisories starting Monday, September 3rd until Thursday, September 13th.

Our next project is our Annual Change War to eradicate Polio. Polio is still endemic in three countries and Early Act is partnering with Rotary for the End Polio now campaign. There will be a contest between 7th and 8th grade. We will be collecting change from November 4th-16th.

Early Act Club will need help with other projects in the spring such as Day of Service and our Annual Car Wash at Seventh Avenue School. The proceeds from the Car Wash will be donated to the District 105 Foundation. Students can earn service hours for participating in these events.

## **Questions About Attendance??**

### What is regular attendance? Why is it so important?

Full day school attendance is vital to student success. Students who arrive late or leave early miss important segments of classroom instruction. Tardiness and early dismissal is also disruptive for other students and the teacher.

It should be of no surprise that one of the predictors of a child's success in school is their attendance. Students who miss fewer days are more likely to excel in their academic studies. National data reflect that the fewer days missed, the greater the achievement level for students.

For our children, the cost of missing school is falling behind in their learning. The more days that are missed also result in a higher anxiety level for students, as they worry about falling behind and not catching up.

Regular attendance should be the goal of every student. Regular attendance means:

- A student attends school everyday, unless the student has a justified reason.
- A student arrives at school on time.

There is no doubt that it is in the best interest of the child that they attend school regularly. It helps students to be successful academically, and helps create a sense of consistency and routine that reduces anxiety.

### When does the day begin at Gurrie?

Our school day begins at 8:15. That means that a student has gone to their locker, and is in their first period class by the time the bell rings at 8:15. It is important that you call Gurrie when you know that your child will not be in school. Please call 708-482-2720 and report the absence as soon as you are aware, no later than 8:30 a.m. of the day the student is absent. Our secretaries often have to spend a good deal of time calling home(s) to check up on a student who is reported absent by a staff member. We are legally obligated to be able to account for every child, each day. You can leave a message on our school voice mail in the evening or in the early morning before staff has arrived.

Failure to reach a parent may result in the local police being called and asked to make a wellness check on the family. As stated above, we are legally obligated to account for each student every day.

Please keep this list in a convenient place for future reference. Call the host schools on away game days for directions to the school or playing field. Playing fields may change from year to year or due to unforeseen circumstances such as construction or weather. Because of this it is always best to call the host school for directions to the playing fields.

### **Go Tigers!**

#### <u>All student athletes must have a sports</u> physical dated within the school calendar year in which they are participating. For the 2018-2019 school year the sports physical must be dated between May 15, 2018 and May, 2019.

Athletic permit forms are available from the school office all year. A student who wishes to participate in inter-school sports must have turned in this form before he or she may attend the first practice. This form must be signed and dated by the athlete's doctor in the top portion, and the bottom emergency information portion must be completely filled out and signed by the athlete's parent or guardian. In addition, on the back page the parent or guardian will read and sign to acknowledge agreement and understanding of the student athletic and head injury policies.

# **After School Activities**

We are very excited about the many activities that are beginning at Gurrie. Boy's Softball, Girl's Basketball, and Cross Country have begun. We wish all our sports teams the best of luck this year.

Here are a few frequently asked questions about sporting events:

### What time do games begin?

Basketball and volleyball games begin at approximately 4:15. Softball games and Cross Country meets usually begin around the same time.

### What time do games end and when should I pick up my child?

Basketball and volleyball games will usually end between 6:00 and 6:15 PM. If your child is only staying for the first basketball or volleyball game, then they will ready to be picked up at 5:15. Softball games usually end around 5:00 PM. Cross Country meets will vary based on number of schools involved. But a good rule of thumb for a Cross Country meets is one hour and a half.

### Can students come and go from basketball or volleyball games?

No. Students may report to the gym at 3:30 on the day of the event. Prior to that, they need to under the supervision of a teacher. Once the game begins, if a student leaves the building, they will not be allowed to come back to the game. We need to be able to account for the students we are supervising.

### Should students arrange for a ride prior to the end of the game?

Yes. If your child is staying for the game, they should have their ride arranged prior to the end of the game. Students may use their advisors phone to call *earlier* in the day to arrange for a ride. There is a complete schedule of events on our Gurrie web site as well as in the school calendar.
