Chocolate Chip Cake Mix Cookies

Ingredients

1 (18.25 ounce) package chocolate chip cake mix with pudding

2 eggs1/2 cup vegetable oil1/2 cup raisins1/2 cup rolled oats1 cup mini semi-sweet choco-

late chips

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Mix together the cake mix, eggs, oil, raisins, oatmeal and chocolate chips. Stir well.

Drop by teaspoonful onto a greased cookie sheet (Baking stones yield best results).

Bake for about 8-10 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool for 1 minute before removing from cookie sheet.

NOTE: For even more chocolate, put a large chocolate kiss in the center of each cookie 1 minute before removing from oven.

Pineapple Bars

Ingredients

1 cup crushed pineapple with juice

1 cup white sugar

2 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch

1 tablespoon butter

1 cup water

3/4 cup shortening

1 cup packed brown sugar

1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon salt

1 1/2 cups rolled oats

Directions

To Make Pineapple Filling: Mix 1 cup crushed pineapple and juice (8 1/4-ounce can), 1 cup sugar, 2 1/2 Tablespoons cornstarch, 1 Tablespoon butter, and 1 cup water in saucepan. Cook until thickened, cool.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Cream together shortening and sugar thoroughly.

Stir in flour, baking soda and salt.


Mix in rolled oats.

Press and flatten half of the mixture over bottom of a 13 x 9 1/2 x 2 inch greased pan.

Spread with cooled filling. Top with remaining crumb mixture, patting lightly. Bake 25 to 30 minutes, or until lightly browned. While warm cut into bars and remove from pan.
