

Greatest Summer Olympics Moments

Starting on July 27, the Summer Olympics will be taking place in London, England. The Olympics feature athletes from around the world competing in many different sports, such as gymnastics and swimming. Two of the greatest Olympians include Nadia Comaneci in gymnastics and Michael Phelps in swimming.



One of the most exciting Summer Olympic sports is gymnastics. This is a combination of four events: beam, bars, floor exercise, and vault. One great Olympian is a young girl who started at age six and accomplished a perfect score in the Olympics seven times in a row. She gained three gold medals in 1972, 1976 and 1999 in both a group competition and by herself. Her name is Nadia Comaneci. She was the first person in history to get a perfect score. Despite her perfect scores, Nadia was in a group competition so her country of Romania came in second place.

In 1975 Nadia Comaneci (age 13) was a European champion. One of Nadia's first competitions involved a balance beam routine that was a part of a team competition with a score of 9.9. She continued with great scores for floor and vault. The last competition event was the uneven bars, which was where she achieved perfection. Out of all the best gymnasts, I believe Nadia Comaneci is the most talented ever.

Even though Nadia was the greatest Olympian at gymnastics, Michael Phelps can be considered the greatest Olympic swimmers ever. He has won 16 medals: six gold, two bronze, and, the rest silver. Michael Phelps holds the record for the most medals. In 2004 and 2008, Michael won eight medals. Michael Phelps has also been the World Swimmer of the

Year six times and American Swimmer of the year a whopping eight times.

In all, Michael has won 66 medals: 54 gold, nine silver, and three bronze medals. Michael's achievements as a swimmer lead to Sports Man of the Year in 2008. A few strokes in swimming that Michael does are called the, backstroke, freestyle, and the butterfly.

Michael Phelps's nickname is the "Baltimore Bullet" for his outstanding speed in swimming. A few more fun facts are that Michael's full name is Michael Fred Phelps; Michael was born in Baltimore, Maryland on June 30, 1985, and is 6 ft. 4 inches tall. Lastly, 2012 is Michael Phelps last year of being in the Olympics.

These are just a few of the great summer Olympic sports that are coming up very soon. Be sure to watch the Olympics in London, England on July 27– August 12.

Starved Rock State Park is Great for Everyone
