Jim Kelly, Quarterback, Buffalo Bills.

Kelly was born February 14, 1960. He grew up in East Brady, Pennsylvania. In high school, Kelly won all state honors for 3,915 passing yards and 44 touchdowns. Jim Kelly was the third quarterback drafted in the 1983 draft. He led the Buffalo Bills to four straight Super Bowls in 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993, but he never won one.




Franco Harris, Fullback, Pittsburgh Steelers. Harris was born March 7, 1950 in Fort Nix, New Jersey. He got drafted by the Steelers in 1972. He was the 13th pick overall. He had 100 TOUCH-DOWNS, he caught 307 passes and rushed for an average of 5.6 yards a carry. Harris' dad served in





Joe Greene, Pittsburgh Steelers, Defensive Tackle.



Greene had 16 fumble recoveries. He got his nickname from his college, University of North Texas, he was called the Mean Green.



Walter Payton, Chicago Bears, Running Back. Born in Columbia, Mississippi. Payton was drafted in the first round by the Bears. In the 1977 season, Payton ran for 1,852 yards. Also in that year, he broke OJ Simpson's record for most yards in a game, rushing for 275 yards. This record stood for 23 years until Corey Dillon of the Cincinnati Bengals ran for 278 against the Broncos in 2000. Adri-

an Peterson currently has the record of 296 yards.

Payton played 13 seasons with the Bears. In the 1978 season he won Pro Bowl MVP.



Mike Ditka, Bears, Eagles, Cowboys, Tight End, Head Coach

Born in Carnegie, Pennsylvania on October 18, 1939. Ditka was the 5th pick in the first round of the draft. Ditka won the 1961 Rookie of the Year. In his whole career, he had 5,812 yards, 43 touchdowns and 427 receptions. As a player he led his team to three NFC/NFL Championships.



Ditka also coached the Bears to the 1986 championship where they beat the New England Patriots 46-10. In 1988 he won Coach of the Year award, and he also coached the Saints.





something powerful and strong, but most importantly free, it can go


Anywhere it pleases, flying to the north, south, west, or the east, anywhere its curious attitude wills it to go,






Movie Review: Soul Surfer


