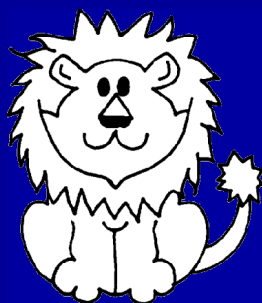

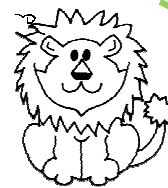

ASSESSMENT TALK: Come join us at the April 13th PTO meeting (new time is 8:40 a.m.) to learn more about overall assessments in District 105. We will review what assessments we use in this district and how they are used to help students best. We will talk about the differences between assessments and how we use different components to drive instruction. ALL are welcome. A PowerPoint will be provided on our website if you cannot attend.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE: The Safety Assembly was very informative, and the students were shown what our building will look like when we reopen in the fall. Please find the PowerPoint from this assembly on our website. In the meantime, here are some reminders and answers to some of the students' questions: *(Their reactions to some of the drawings and slides were priceless!)*

- Our playground will be

open for as long as possible, even for part or all of this summer.

- Our student bathrooms will be updated with new sinks, toilets, and a few other spruce ups! (This received a BIG cheer!)
- Our gym will get a fresh coat of paint and a good cleaning. (The floor finish will most likely be addressed during one of the holiday breaks.)
- All signs will be posted and all students must follow the directions on the signs on the fencing, even if a ball goes astray over the summer. (In other words, Keep Out means Keep Out, no matter what.)

There will be other details that will add to the overall work from this construction project and these items have been identified throughout the bidding process. Please see updates on the website.

SUMMER SCHOOL CHANGES: Our summer school program has received a complete overhaul as the district has been researching ways to improve this program and reduce regression from the summer break. Please see the flyer and website for specific dates and times of the new and improved program. If your child is recommended for summer school, please make every effort to join this very important pro-

gram. The dates are closer to the opening of the new year, rather than follow up of our current year. (July 18-August 11th)

PLANNING FOR NEXT YEAR: As you may know, Spring Avenue staff places a lot of care and planning into the groupings of students for each school year. We use what we know, what we have learned and observed, data, and other important information to compile preliminary class lists. Parents have a chance to share their thoughts about how their child learns and peers that may work well to help their child in a learning situation. Please look for the Student Profile sheet (to be attached to the website) for you to put your thoughts about your child. Each form is handled confidentially and considered carefully as we group students. Since ALL teachers are excellent educators and are amazing teams, we ask that you not request specific teachers in this process, but your opinions and observations of how your child learns are very important to us.

Easter Seals Provides Place for Learning and Fun

You know how spring is such a merry time? All the running around, swimming, and skipping among the flowers. Well during that time, have you ever thought of the people who can't do those things? Or at least can't do them as easily as you. Yes, people like that are out there. In fact, there are millions of them. Some with disabilities more severe than others. The smiling young lady pictured here is Amy Liss. Because she had a stroke before she was born, Amy now has a form of cerebral palsy and is unable to use her legs. Cerebral palsy is a condition caused by injury to the parts of the brain that control our ability to use our muscles and bodies. Cerebral means having to do with the brain. Palsy means weakness or problems with using the muscles. Often the injury happens before birth, sometimes during delivery, or soon after being born. Cerebral palsy does not get worse over time.

Cerebral palsy can range from mild to severe. Those with a mild form of the condition can walk, but may have a limp or may need a special leg brace or a cane. A person with moderate or severe injuries may have to use a wheelchair and other special equipment. Cerebral palsy occurs in about 2 out of every 1,000 babies born. There are several organizations that have been formed to help people who have these, or other disabilities.

One of these organizations, National Easter Seals, was first formed in 1919 by a man named Edgar F. Allen. Edgar originally created Easter Seals as the National Society for Crippled Children. Easter Seals now serves thousands of people with disabilities. People of all ages, all sizes, all shapes, and all different problems, can always go to Easter Seals for help. Both Amy and her twin sister Kelly work at Easter Seals DuPage and the Fox Valley Region in Villa Park.

I interviewed my friend Amy about Easter Seals, and here is what she said. She is 28 years old and has been going to Easter Seals since she was 5 months old! That is a long time. She was born three months early and because of that early birth, her brain was damaged. She cannot sit, stand, run, walk, or feed herself without help because her muscles cannot properly work.

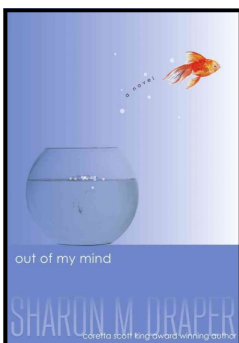
Easter Seals is helping her become more independent every day. With Easter Seals, she has become able to walk with a walker! Though it may seem little to you, it is a huge accomplishment for her. She loves Easter Seals because she said "I wouldn't be who I am today without Easter Seals." Amy's twin sister, Kelly, said, "Having a sister with disabilities is the same as having one without. You just have to learn to do some things differently."

Kelly works as a special events manager at Easter Seals. That means she helps plan and design fundraisers for Easter Seals. Kelly also said that her job can sometimes be a little stressful, but very fun because she works with great people and for a great cause.

This is a capybara. Some of their closest relatives are chinchillas and guinea pigs. Adults can grow to be 130 centimeters (4.3ft), and they can weigh up to 140lbs. Females are slightly heavier than males.

Capybaras are herbivores so that means they mostly eat grass and aquatic plants. Capybaras are awesome swimmers and can survive completely underwater for up to five minutes. A capybara can sleep underwater, keeping its nose just over the waterline. They barely sleep usually dozing off throughout the day.



This creature is an Angora rabbit. It's one of the oldest domestic animals. This rabbit is bred for its soft wool. It was popular in France in the 18th century. The Angora first appeared in America in the 20th century.

These rabbits can weigh up to 4-7lbs. Because their fur is so thick that it needs to be groomed twice a week. Their facial features make these rabbits look like they have beards!

Angoras are common as a pets because they are very calm in nature. They are great pets because they are very playful and love being with people. Angoras love playing with all kinds of toys, such as an old glove, or pine cone, or even a stuffed sock. They can live up to 5-7 years.



This cute animal is an aye-aye. An aye-aye is a lemur. They are native in Madagascar. This little guy is the world's largest nocturnal primate. They are quiet and the only sound they make is the tapping of looking for food. Aye-ayes tap on the trunks and branches of the trees they visit up to 8 times per second, and then they listen to the echo produced to find hollow chambers inside. After a chamber is found they will chew a hole into the wood and get grubs out of the hole with their narrow and bony middle fingers. The aye-ayes also eat fruits, fungi and nectar.

This cutie is near threatened because of deforestation and because some of the native people in that area find these little critters a nuisance.

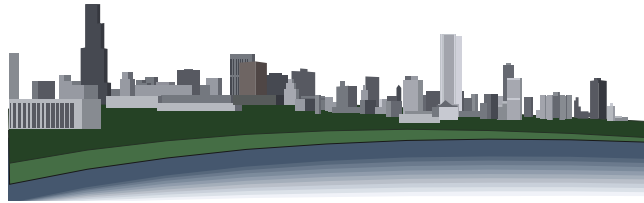
This program comes free with museum admission.

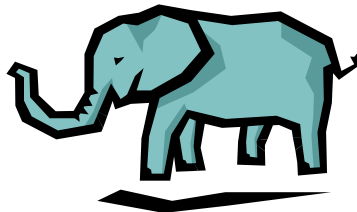
The History of Elephants

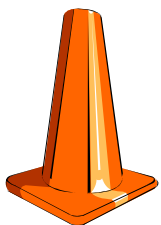

Hedgehogs Are Peculiar Yet Fun Pets

What swims, climbs walls and can run away from predators at the speed of 4.5 miles per hour?

Hedgehogs! These are definitely peculiar little creatures. With their sharp quills and small bodies, hedgehogs can do just about anything. From swimming to climbing walls and running away from predators.

Hedgehogs are found around the world. They are found in Europe, Asia, Africa, and also New Zealand. They live in warm climates with many predators. They have an interesting diet that includes lots of insects, worms, centipedes, snails, mice, frogs, lizards, eggs, and much more.

Hedgehogs are nocturnal which means that they sleep all day long and wake up during the night to search for breakfast. While searching for food they rely on their senses of hearing and smell.

They rely on those senses because their eyesight is very weak. In order to survive from being eaten by predators, they use their quills for protection. When they get afraid they will curl up into a ball position and poke their quills out of their bodies. The hedgehog looks like a cactus when it does this and scares predators away.

When hedgehogs are born there are up to seven born in a litter. When born, hedgehogs' quills are surprisingly soft and short. After birth the spines harden, becoming stiffer, sharper, and longer. A



hedgehog's quills are simply strands of hair that are coated in the same material that human fingernails are made of. Hedgehogs are not the smartest animals. They get scared very easily.

I have lots of experience with hedgehogs because I have one as a pet. They can actually be potty trained to use a litter box. My hedgehog usually eats meal worms, crickets, cat food, lettuce, fruits, and a few other things. Every night my hedgehog Bella wakes up at about 11:00 pm and is on her wheel for three hours nonstop. She then goes to bed when we wake up. Bella will get up whenever you want her to, though. Sadly hedgehogs are becoming endangered. People around the world are trying to help them.

Craft Corner: marble magnets

Materials:

Circle cutter and cutting mat, double sided scrapbook paper with desired, small print, clear, large craft marbles (flat, one sided commonly found in the floral department), and glass bead bonding glue, small and strong magnets and medium sized wedding bag for storage.

Project:

Choose an image (it can be printed, you can draw it or get it from a magazine) you

want, position your cutter, cut your image out and prepare to attach it to a marble with your glass glue. Put a bead of glue on the center of your image and “squish” your marble down on top. Keep pressing until the glue spreads to the edges of the entire image with no air bubbles. Now, turn the marble over and glue the magnet down.

This is where the double sided paper comes in handy. The back of your magnet will have a uniform finished ap-

pearance. Allow the project to cure or “set” for 24 hours. You can put them a wedding bag or some other type of bag to put them in for gifts or you can keep them and put them in lockers or on your kitchen fridge. You can easily can make dozens of chunky, beautiful magnets to give for Christmas, birthdays, or to store up for other times in the year.

Of course you will want to keep your favorite magnets for yourself.

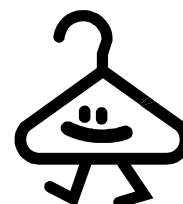

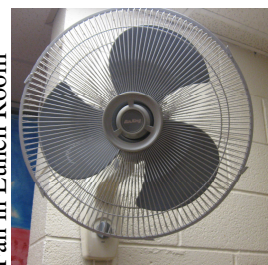

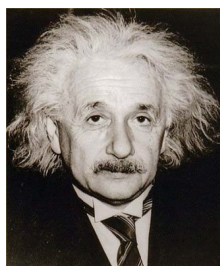
