

RECOGNIZED FOR EXCELLENCE BY THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION District 105 Has Two National Blue Ribbon Schools!

ach year, the U.S. Department of Education recognizes the best public and private elementary, middle and high schools

in the country through the National Blue Ribbon Schools Program. Using standards of excellence evidenced by student achievement measures and research-based indicators of school quality, the Department honors schools in which students either achieve very high learning standards (*Exemplary High Performing Schools*) or are making notable improvements in closing the achievement gap (*Exemplary Gap Closing Schools*). The Blue Ribbon Schools award affirms the hard work of students, educators, families and communities in creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging content.

Of the hundreds of thousands of schools in the country, only a few hundred are selected to receive this honor each year. On September 30, U.S. Secretary of Education Arnie Duncan announced that Spring Avenue and Seventh Avenue schools were among the 287 public and 50 private schools nationwide to receive the National Blue Ribbon Schools award. The district's two schools were recognized in the category of *Exemplary High Performing Schools*.

Regarding the 2014 Blue Ribbon Schools award recipients, Secretary Duncan stated:

These great schools are fulfilling the promise of American education – that all students, no matter their name or zip code, can flourish when schools provide safe, creative, and challenging learning environments. National Blue Ribbon Schools are models of consistent excellence and a resource for other schools and districts. We celebrate them for their tireless effort and boundless creativity in reaching and teaching every student.

In its 32-year history, the National Blue Ribbon Schools program has recognized only 7,900 of America's schools. In Illinois, just 13 public elementary schools, and 9 private schools earned the 2014 Blue Ribbon Schools award. District 105 is the only Illinois school district to have more than one school achieve this recognition



this year!

The Department of Education asks the top education official in every state to nominate public schools for the National Blue Ribbon Schools award. (Private schools are nominated through the Council for American Private Education.) Nominated schools are then invited to complete a difficult application that asks for a narrative "snapshot" of the school, along with other detailed information that includes curriculum, parent/community involvement, teacher professional development, instructional methods,

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Full-day KINDERGARTEN is Studied

District 105 offers students a partial-day kindergarten program. Currently, the Board of Education is exploring the option of full-day kindergarten. To undertake this study, the district has created a kindergarten committee comprised of parents, teachers, and administrators from all District 105 school communities. This exploratory committee is examining research reflecting the benefits and challenges associated with full-day kindergarten, exploring a variety of full-day kindergarten program models currently in place in other districts, and examining the feedback from a community survey. With this information, the committee will make a recommendation to the Board of Education regarding full-day kindergarten. If the Board of Education decides to offer a full-day kindergarten option, per Illinois state requirements, a half-day kindergarten option will also be available to District 105 families.

Some of the survey results were:

Parent Community – 76% strongly support fullday kindergarten; 10% somewhat support it; 9% do not support it; 5% are not sure.

Staff Community – 78% strongly support fullday kindergarten; 17% somewhat support it; 5% do not support it; 0% are not sure.

GIFTED PROGRAM Renewal

The district's gifted program has been completely renewed. Following the Board of Education's approval of the Gifted Program Renewal Committee's recommendations, the district's new English/language arts (ELA) and math specialists are hard at work. For ELA, this marks the first year the district is using a flexible, push-in model of learning aligned to classroom goals and grade-level Common Core ELA standards. The three new ELA specialists in the Advanced Academics Department have been working with both students and teachers in grades 3-6 to model best practices, team teach, as well as provide materials and enrich learning.

An additional K-4 math specialist was hired. There are now two K-4 math specialists, one at Spring Avenue and Hodgkins, and one at Seventh Avenue and Ideal. They are fostering students' math talents.

The new gifted program model is flexible in nature. As students complete unit study pre-tests, teachers determine which students need enrichment and advancement because they are demonstrating mastery of the unit's learning standards. Unit by unit, the needs of students will change, and therefore, the high achieving students with whom the specialists are working with can and will change also.

Foundation News

The District 105 Foundation sponsored a Back-to-School Family Night at Hodgkins Park District on Friday, September 12. Despite a storm that moved the event inside, over 500 community members watched the movie *Frozen*, heard music by *The Saracens Band*, and enjoyed food from Q BBQ, LaGrange.

SUMMER CONNECT Program

Throughout the country, summer learning regression is a well-known problem. To help minimize that regression, and to keep students engaged in learning, District 105 offers a "Summer CONNECT" program. This year, the program was revised from the previous coach-to-student model to one based on enrichment and variety. The revised program gave students the ability to experience a wide range of classes and to explore learning in a new way, by offering more than 150 unique learning explorations. Fifty teachers taught these explorations and over 1,500 students participated!

Teachers used their expertise to create lessons that aligned with the new Illinois State Common Core Learning Standards. These unique classes included baseball card statistics, beginning orienteering, creating a budget for a do-it-yourself project, playing bridge, digital photography, the history of blues and hip hop, bugs, and reading with dogs, to name a few.

In addition, all five school libraries were open all summer. During that time, 1,146 students engaged in the Open Library program and checked out 4,577 books.

"Our mission as a district is to empower students to pursue their interests, talents, and dreams," explained Kathryn Heeke, director of curriculum and instruction. "The Summer CONNECT explorations program created the opportunity for students to explore, think, and learn through a variety of classes and topics. These experiences contribute to the model of life our students create. As we work to prepare these students for college, career, and citizenship readiness, we do so without knowing what actual types of jobs they will be doing, because in all likelihood, many of those jobs do not yet exist. So through many learning opportunities, we must teach them how to think critically and how to be responsible for their own learning. The CONNECT Program helps maintain the momentum of this learning for the entire year."

A Message from Dr. Glenn Schlichting, Superintendent

With two District 105 schools recognized as Blue Ribbon Schools for 2014, we are very proud of how well this award reflects on the overall success of the district and the commitment to excellence in each of our five school communities. The student demographics in our schools are quite diverse. Nevertheless, our dedication to preparing students for college and career readiness is consistent across the district. Our students bring very different learning needs to our diverse school settings, **but all five of our schools earn top national rankings for the fall to spring achievement progress their students make each year.** This success of moving students forward, regardless of their achievement, language, racial, and socioeconomic backgrounds, is our definition of High Performance in our District 105 schools.

We are very honored that Seventh Avenue and Spring Avenue Schools received this prestigious award. We are also very proud of the passionate work of our students, staff, parents, and community members in all five of our schools as they strive to do what 2011 National Superintendent of the Year Marc Johnson describes as, "getting better at getting better."

Senate Bill 16 SCHOOL FUNDING REFORM

he State of Illinois has been looking at ways to change education funding, which has remained unchanged since 1997. Senate Bill 16 (SB16) has come from that effort. If enacted into law, SB16 will make sweeping changes in how the state funds education and those changes will have a significantly negative impact on School District 105.

SB16 does not increase the level of state funding for education, but it changes the way in which the funds are distributed to local school districts. Generally, school districts with higher assessed property values will receive much less state funding while other districts in the State with lower assessed property values will receive much more State funding. As written, SB16 also provides a special cost benefit to the Chicago Public Schools. SB16 neither addresses the issue of an increase in unfunded obligations to school districts, nor the issue of the State not being able to meet its current obligations to fund education.

How will SB16 impact District 105?

Based on State Board of Education calculations, District 105 will lose 82% of its state funding, or just over \$1,000,000 per year. The Bill would be phased in over a four-year period with District 105 losing increasing percentages of its state funding in each of the first three years and a full \$1,000,000 reduction in state funding beginning in year four.

District 105 will be one of the districts most severely impacted by SB16. Already, local taxpayers provide more than 90% of the funding for our District 105 schools. Over the years, the state has reduced its share of funding for District 105 schools while increasing unfunded obligations for programs and services.

The district has been fiscally responsible and lived within its means. Over the last five years, operational expenses have increased annually 2.3% while overall enrollment has increased by an average of 3.2%, and enrollment in required bilingual programs has more than doubled. During this same period, state and Federal regulations have caused significant increases in district costs in several areas including transportation, special education, and student testing. If SB16 passes, District 105 will have to reduce operational expenses in several areas to maintain a balanced budget.

What Can Our Community Do?

Senate Bill 16 has already passed the State Senate. It is expected that SB16 will be voted on by the Illinois House of Representatives sometime following the fall election. If you are concerned about the impact of SB16 on the educational programming and taxpayers in District 105, please contact your state legislators and voice your opinion.
