The D105 Difference

Empowering Students to Pursue Their Interests, Talents and Dreams

LaGrange School District 105 annually surveys the district community to gather perceptual data related to district goals, priorities, strategies, and commitments.

The survey items are connected to the district's strategic goals, which are –

GOAL 1: Student Achievement

GOAL 2: Supportive Learning Environment

GOAL 3: Engaged Families and Communities

GOAL 4: Quality Staff

GOAL 5: Value-added Resources

Highlights of the survey responses from the D105 annual survey, which was administered to students, teachers, and parents in the spring of 2018, include:

- 92% of teachers report that the goals and priorities of the district are clear to them.
- 93% of teachers report that D105 facilities are kept safe.
- 96% of parents report that their child's classroom and school have the equipment, materials, and supplies needed to support learning.
- 95% of students report that they expect to attend college.
- 95% of students report that their teachers care about them.
- 97% of parents report that their child likes going to their school.
- 96% of students report that their school is a "good place for me to learn."
- 95% of students report that they feel safe at school.
- 99% of parents report that their child feels safe at school.
- 94% of teachers feel that their school provides an atmosphere where every student can achieve.
- 98% of parents report that they are welcome in the school and their support and assistance are sought by the school.

SUMMER BOOK CLUB

D105 held its first Summer Book Club for K-8 families at Ideal School on the evening of June 27, as part of the Summer CONNECT Learning Program (see page 3). Research indicates that families who read together create valuable learning experiences for their children.

Prior to the event, families received a copy of the book, *What Was the Great Chicago Fire?* by Janet B. Pascal. Parents read it with their children. Over 140 participants attended the event to discuss the book and enjoy book-related activities. Families visited a variety of stations, with self-paced, hands-on activities.

Event highlights included a modern fire truck and ambulance provided by the Pleasantview Fire Protection District. Activity stations showcased local history, early railroad routes, before-and-after photos of the Chicago Fire, the 1893 Columbian Exposition, and more.

Joanna Marek, library media specialist, commented, "More than 20 staff members supported the Summer Book Club and many more helped plan it. Families had a great time and asked what book we would be reading next!"

Superintendent Schlichting Retires



Dr. Glenn Schlichting retired on June 30. His very capable leadership guided the district for 16 years, as assistant superintendent

received the Blue Ribbon recognition that year.

The district also saw gains in the placement of students from D105 into Lyons Township High School Accelerated Honors classes. Over the course of six fiscal years (2013-2018), the placement rates rose from 39 to 66% in math, 45 to 60% in English/language arts, and from 26 to 45% in science.

Dr. Schlichting also received recognition from the state for his "extraordinary efforts" as one of 21 Illinois superintendents who were named as the "2018 Regional Superintendents of Distinction." These superintendents were selected by their peers based on leadership, communication, professionalism, and community involvement. The Horace Mann Companies, the Illinois Association of School Administrators, the Illinois State Board of Education, and the Illinois Principals' Association sponsored the recognition and hosted a luncheon in Springfield to honor these superintendents.

Honored and respected by students, teachers, administrators, staff and parents, Dr. Schlichting leaves a legacy of kindness, caring, community, and best practices in education for all D105 students.

He was instrumental in moving education in the district forward, always striving to assure that students had every possible opportunity to meet their potential.

In 2014, under his watch, two of the district schools, Spring Avenue and Seventh Avenue, were recognized by the U.S. Department of Education as Blue Ribbon Schools. This award honors public and private elementary, middle, and high schools at which students either achieved very high learning standards or made notable improvements in closing the achievement gap. The award celebrates the hard work of students, educators, families and communities that create safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging content. studies, and the district's own research, show that students lose from one to three months of learning over the summer. The CONNECT program aims to help parents and students close this learning gap.

From June through August, the CONNECT program offered many opportunities for learning. These included summer learning goals for each grade level, which families could access through the district website. Students could also access skills practice in English/language arts and math through an online account targeted to each student's individual MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) assessment results.

Teachers and staff compiled a "Summer Learning for All" web page with ideas for summer learning. An online calendar of math and reading activities offered daily learning activities.

For the seventh summer, D105 offered the Summer CONNECT Learning program. National

All five district libraries were open with a summer schedule.

Each elementary school held a Math and Literacy Family Game Night with a wide range of games for all age ranges that children and parents enjoyed.

Family Summer Book Club was a special event where all participants read and discussed the same book. (See related article, *Summer Book Club*, on page one.)

Sixth- through eighth-grade students interested in math and science could take an IMSA (Illinois Math and Science Academy) Fusion Session on cryptology. A variety of learning sessions were also available for Gurrie Middle School students.

"Through goal setting, math/literacy GAME nights, online learning opportunities and suggested learning activities for parents and children, D105 remains committed to maintaining student learning over the summer," said Kathryn Heeke, director of curriculum and instruction.

Class of 2018: Mission Accomplished!

"We are very proud of the success of our eighth grade graduating class," stated Gurrie Middle School Principal Ed Hood. "The class earned top national rankings on math and reading achievement tests, participated in more than 2,600 hours of community service during their two years at Gurrie Middle School, and treated each other and their teachers respectfully, as reflected by the results of their satisfaction surveys and their extremely low number of disciplinary referrals. The percentage of our graduating students scheduled into advanced and honors courses at Lyons Township High School is among the highest since we began tracking this data in 2003. Sixty percent of this class is scheduled into Honors/Accelerated English courses, 66% are taking Honors/Accelerated Math courses, and 45% will tackle Honors/Accelerated Science classes."

Capstone Celebration Honors Grads, Teachers

D105 held its third annual Capstone event, sponsored by the Countryside Rotary Club, on Monday, May 7, at Capri Banquets in Countryside.

Thirty-six participating D105 graduates shared their reflections on what they have accomplished and their plans for future success. The students also recognized 26 D105 staff members who had most influenced them. Participating students' families, recognized staff members, D105 administrators, Board of Education members, Rotary Club members, and

business and political leaders attended the celebration, which reflected the graduating class's outstanding achievements. After having lunch with their teachers, students read their essays to the audience.

Gurrie Middle School Principal Ed Hood remarked, "It was a great event. It is so special to hear the ways in which our educators make an impact on our students, as told in our students' own words. I am extremely proud of all our students and staff. The success our students enjoy is a result of our parents, community, and staff coming together to support and continually challenge these young people."

School Citizen of the Year Awards

Each year, West 40, the Illinois educational service center for the West Cook County region, hosts the "School Citizen of the Year" (SCOTY) Awards. Every school in the area is asked to select one student who is an exceptional role model for other students. SCOTY winners are recognized in a ceremony in the spring. Writing Festival

The annual spring writing festival is a D105 tradition. Students write original pieces, then teachers select two finalists from each class. Their work is scored by the Literacy Committee. The authors

Academic Talent Search

Selected D105 students participate in the annual Midwest Academic Talent Search (NUMATS), sponsored by Northwestern University's Center for Talent Development. NUMATS is a program that offers above-grade-level testing for academically talented students. The SAT and ACT assessments, designed for students in grades 11 and 12, are administered to students in grades 6 through 9.

In May, an awards ceremony recognized students from 15 area schools who received high test scores.

Musicians Excel

Orchestra members and eighth-grade students Ella Bylsma and Lana Zivko placed in the Illinois Music Educators Association Junior Orchestra Festival. The symphony orchestra earned a Division 1, Superior rating in the Illinois Grade School Music Association (IGSMA) District contest, and another Division 1, Superior rating at the High Note Festival. The choir earned a Division 2, Excellent rating at the IGSMA District Contest, and a Division 1, Superior rating at the High Note Festival.

The fourth- through eighth-grade concert band earned a Superior rating at the High Note Festival, and the Gurrie Jazz Ensemble achieved a 1, the highest rating, at the IGSMA competition. The annual Band-aid Concert raised more than \$1,600 provided for the non-profit Karam Foundation that offers humanitarian relief for victims of the Syrian crisis. The event featured the talents of D105's top music groups, as well as a captivating performance by lead singer/songwriter Bassel Almadani of the soul-funk group *Bassel & the Supernaturals*, who appeared on the charity's behalf.

MAP Results

Each year, District 105 students in kindergarten through eighth-grade take the nationally norm-referenced Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) test. Students are assessed in the areas of reading and math in the winter and spring of each academic year (kindergarteners are assessed in the fall as well). The results place District 105 above the ninetieth percentile nationally for student growth and above the eighty-fifth percentile nationally for student achievement. The results of the 2017-2018 school year include:

Progress

This spring, 69% of our students met their MATH progress targets far exceeding not only the district's two-year rolling progress average (57%), but also surpassed both the district target (63%) and the progress made by our benchmark district (55%).

In READING, 65% of our students met their progress targets exceeding the district's two-year rolling average (60%), and also surpassed both the district target (63%) and the progress made by our benchmark district (53%).

Achievement

68% of our students performed at or above the fiftieth percentile in MATH, exceeding the district's two-year rolling average (62%), and surpassing the progress made by our benchmark district (53%).

In READING, 70% of our students performed at or above the fiftieth percentile, exceeding the district's two-year rolling average (67%), and surpassing the progress made by our benchmark district (54%).

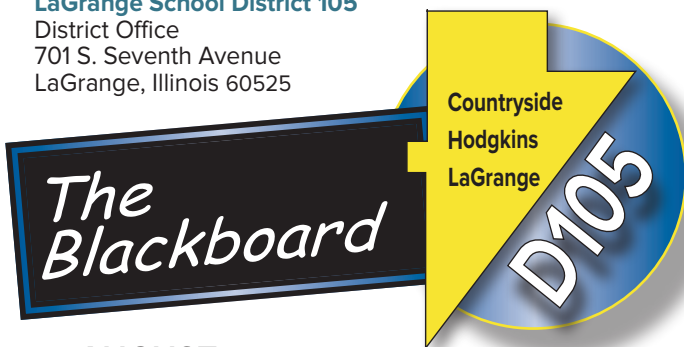
